## OUR SCHOOLING FUTURES: STRONGER TOGETHER - THE TOMORROW'S SCHOOLS REPORT REVIEW

The report has been out since late 2018, you may have seen information about this in the media or in various publications.

This is the most important and comprehensive review/shake up of our whole education system since the introduction of Tomorrow's Schools in 1998.

The report recommends some major changes that may have far reaching consequences into the future, should all the changes be made.

The proposed change will affect all levels from Early Childhood, Primary, Intermediate, Secondary through to Tertiary (Poly Techs and Universities).

# The Taskforce (Review Team) have identified 8 Key Issues: -

- 1. Governance current Board of Trustees System of Governance to be replaced by a local Hub...
- 2. Schooling Provision nature and type of schooling provided...
- 3. Competition and Choice Change to current zoning and decile system.
- 4. Disability and Learning Support Equitable access to learning opportunities...
- **5. Teaching** better teacher pathways for registration and training, provision of professional learning and development for teachers ...
- **6. School Leadership** regular support and professional development for new and experienced principals, appointment of principals ...
- 7. School Resourcing equity index used instead of decile, equity of staffing entitlement across the sector
- **8. Central Education Agencies** replace NZQA (New Zealand Qualifications Authority), Education Review Office, reposition the New Zealand Teachers Council ...

I have only highlighted a few key things in each area - there is a lot more detail in the actual document. The Review Team will be meeting after April 8th to consider all submissions and draft up a proposed plan of change.

This is your opportunity to have your say about what the education system should look like for the future - this is about your child/ren's future education!!

It is almost time for all submissions to be sent in - due April 7th.

#### **MEASLES**

As you will all be aware, there is a current measles outbreak in the Canterbury region. We now need to do what we can to prepare for any outbreak in our region and to help prevent this happening. With school holidays approaching and people travelling to various parts of the country the chance of coming into contact with measles will increase.

Please be advised the Bay of Plenty is not currently experiencing an outbreak, though an outbreak is highly possible. Anyone (including parents and caregivers can do this).

**What is measles?** Measles, also known as 'English measles' or morbilli, is a potentially serious, highly infectious disease caused by a virus.

How do you catch measles? Measles is spread through contact with infectious droplets from the nose or throat of a person with measles, often during the first 2–4 days of symptoms before the rash appears. One person with measles can pass the disease on to 12–18 people who have not already had measles or been immunised against the disease.

**How common is measles?** New Zealand had large measles epidemics in 1991 and 1997 and continues to have regular smaller outbreaks with the most recent being in 2016. The last measles related death in New Zealand was one of seven during the 1991 epidemic. How serious is measles? Complications from measles are common. They may be caused by the measles virus or a bacteria because the measles virus lowers the body's ability to fight other infections. The risk of complications and death are higher in children under 5 years and adults over 20 years of age. A table listing possible complications of measles is on page two. Anyone who has a weakness of their immune system is at areater risk of very serious disease. These people are often unable to be immunised and rely on protection from those around them being immunised.

What are the symptoms of measles? The illness begins with fever, cough, runny nose and conjunctivitis (inflammation in the eyes), which lasts for 2–4 days. It may be possible to see small white spots (Koplik spots) inside the mouth. A rash appears 2–4 days after the first symptoms, beginning on the head and gradually spreading down the body to the arms and legs. The rash lasts for up to one week.

How do you prevent measles? Immunisation is the best way to prevent measles. In the event of a measles outbreak, unimmunised children and adults born since 1968 who do not have evidence of immunity against measles and who have contact with a measles case are advised NOT to attend early childhood services, school or public places for 14 days after their last contact with the infected person.

Which vaccines protect against measles? The measles vaccine was introduced in New Zealand in 1969 and replaced by the combined measles, mumps, rubella (MMR) vaccine in 1990. The combined measles, mumps, rubella vaccine is the only vaccine available in New Zealand to prevent measles. M-M-R® II and Priorix® are weakened live measles, mumps and rubella vaccines. M-M-R II has been used in New Zealand for many years. Two doses of MMR vaccine are recommended after the age of 12 months, given at least four weeks apart. After the first dose of MMR vaccine, 90–95% of people will be protected against measles.

The board is the employer of all staff in the school and is responsible for setting the school's strategic direction in consultation with parents, staff and students, and for ensuring that its school provides a safe environment and quality education for all its students. Boards are also responsible for overseeing the management of personnel, curriculum, property, finance and administration.
